Thanksgiving Holidays

Thanksgiving Day is a legal holiday in the US This holiday was first celebrated in early colonial times in New England in the mid Seventeenth century.

However, this holiday is patterned after the harvest festivals that are traditional in many parts of the world.

After the first harvest was completed by the Plymouth colonists in 1621, **Governor William Bradford** proclaimed a day of thanksgiving and prayer, shared by all the colonists and neighboring Indians. In 1623 a day of fasting and prayer during a period of drought was changed to one of thanksgiving because the rain came during the prayers. After a while, the custom of having thanksgiving celebrations caught on in New England, so they began celebrating thanksgiving after the harvest. During the American Revolution a yearly day of national thanksgiving was suggested by the Continental Congress.

In 1817 New York State adopted Thanksgiving Day as a yearly custom, and by the middle of the 19th century many other states had done the same. In 1863 President Abraham Lincoln appointed a day of thanksgiving, and since then each president has issued a Thanksgiving Day proclamation. This proclamation is a speech. In the speech, the president picks the day for the holiday, which is the fourth Thursday of November.

Thanksgiving is a government holiday in Canada, celebrated, since 1957, on

the second Monday in October. The Canadians first began to celebrate thanksgiving in 1879.
